She could not be more excited to join the KU family!



Q&A With Rachel Guest

Resident Spotlight

Pgy 5, Rachel Guest

Tell us about yourself.

I'm a current PGY5 resident in the department of plastic surgery. I spent my childhood in upstate New York, where I had a very early exposure to plastic surgery when mv sister underwent serial tissue expansion for removal of a large congenital nevus. I subsequently went to college and medical school with a plan to pursue plastic surgery as a career. I entered the match in 2017 and loved the case volume and variety and department camaraderie

Outside of work, I love long-distance running, board games, planning and hosting events, and going to breweries. Kansas City is the perfect city for all of these things, and the Brewery to Brewery Run really brings together all of these things (some of the breweries even have

Can you talk about your connection through the plastic surgery program and Missy's Boutique?

Missy's Boutique is located in the Westwood Cancer Center and functions as both a gift shop and as a store for surgical garments, breast prostheses, and wigs for patients undergoing chemotherapy. For qualifying cancer patients, the patients-in-need fund can provide these items free of charge.

Breast reconstruction for patients with breast cancer is an important component of plastic surgery, but surgery is just one aspect of their cancer care. Many patients require chemotherapy and/or radiation as well. Missy's boutique is a valuable resource for patients, stocking items

that can be used along their cancer journey.

Tell us about the event.

The Brewery to Brewery Relay for breast reconstruction awareness was first created in 2020 and was born out of the Covid-19 pandemic. After months of restrictions, it seemed like an event that would enhance our department's camaraderie was long due. Additionally, I felt that it was important that our department come together to support our community in some way - many organizations were still recovering slowly from the impact of the pandemic.
